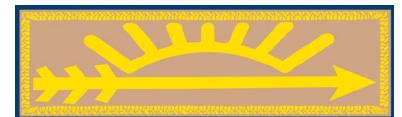

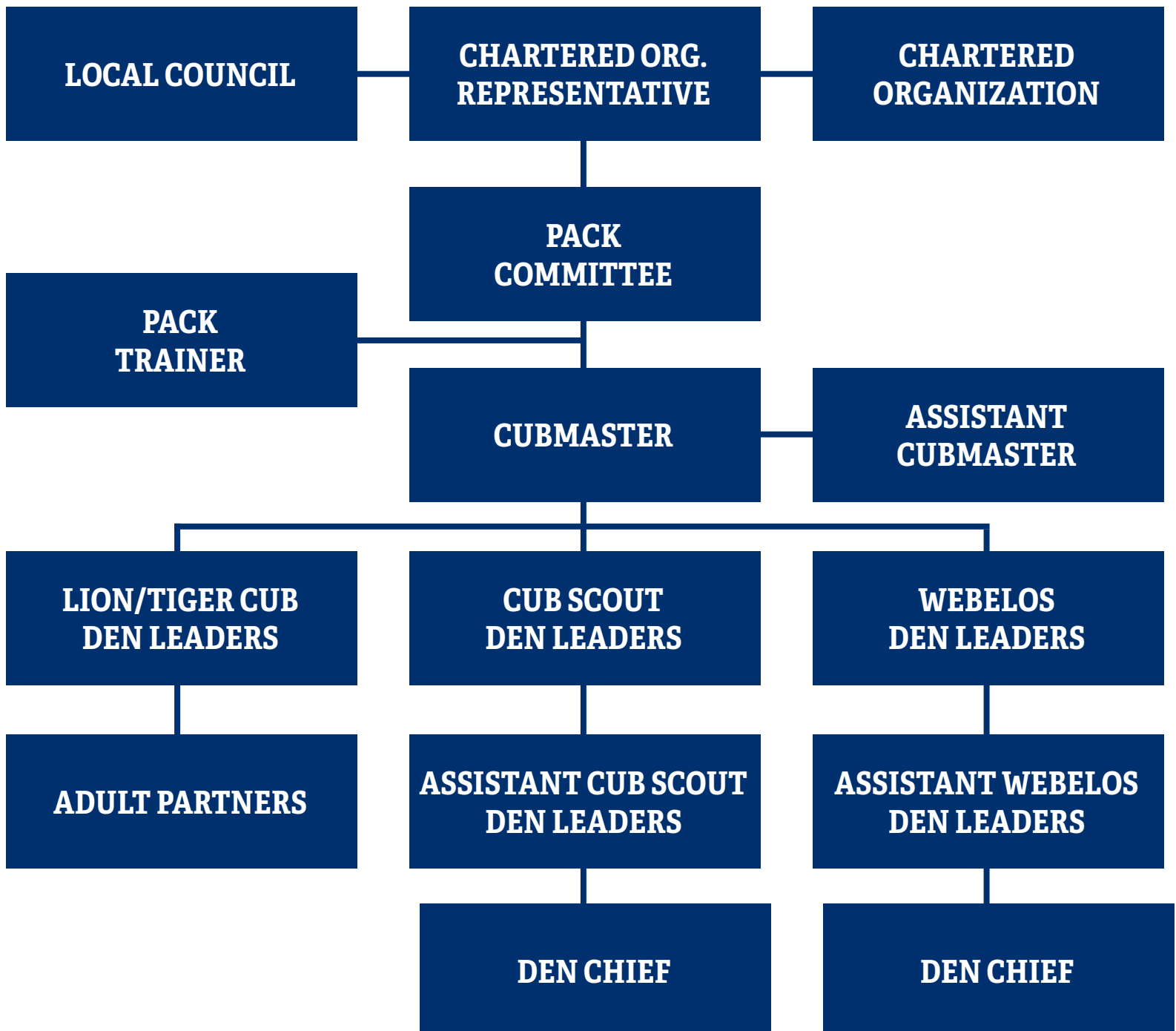

## WE RECOMMEND

- The first thing that your new Scout needs is the appropriate **Handbook**. Once your Scout has the handbook, they can begin working on the requirements for various rank badges.
- A **Scout Uniform** serves as a sign of being a member of Scouting. It also serves as a place for your Scout to display their awards. Please check with your Pack to see what they recommend. Remember that uniforms can be purchased at thrift shops and many Packs have a uniform exchange. Check with Pack Leaders regarding financial assistance if needed.
- Download the free **Scoutbook App** to help keep track of your Scout's advancement right on your phone. Visit **scoutbook.com** for more information.

\*Units are encouraged to do fundraising to decrease the amount of Pack dues required, i.e. Popcorn Sales.

# Your Child, Scouting, and You

As a parent, you want your child to grow up to be a person of character, a participating citizen, self-reliant, and a caring individual. Scouting has these same goals in mind. Scouting weaves lifetime values into fun and educational activities designed to assist parents in strengthening character, good citizenship and personal fitness in youth.

Scouting's values are family values. However, Cub Scout age youth do not join Scouting just to build character. They join because it is fun!

## Programs

### Lion Program | Kindergarten

- The Lion Program is designed to introduce Kindergarten-aged youth and their families to the fun of Scouting.
- Each family is a member of a Lion Den.
- A Lion Den has an experienced Cub Scout Leader called the Lion Guide.
- A Den has six to eight Lions and Adult Partners.
- A Den meets for eight to nine months of the year, two times per month; once for a Den meeting and once for an outing or Pack meeting.
- Each Adult Partner will take turns leading a Den meeting, with the Lion Guide's assistance.

### Tiger Program | First Grade

- Each family is a member of a Tiger Den.
- A Den has a Den Leader and an Assistant.
- A Den has three to eight families.
- Dens meet once a week, regularly scheduled at the leader's convenience, and attend the monthly Pack meeting.
- Meetings are based on the adventures and electives taken from the Tiger Book, and are scheduled by the host Den Leader.

### Cub Scout Program | Second through Fifth Grade

- Your Scout is a member of a Den.
- Each Den has four to eight Scouts.
- Dens meet once a week, regularly scheduled at the leader's convenience, and attend the monthly Pack meeting.
- Led by a Den Leader (usually a parent).
- The Den Leader is assisted by an Assistant Den Leader and often a Den Chief (an older Scouts BSA member).
- Den meetings have games, songs, ceremonies and periodic field trips.





# Pack Organization

## Your Scout is a member of a Pack

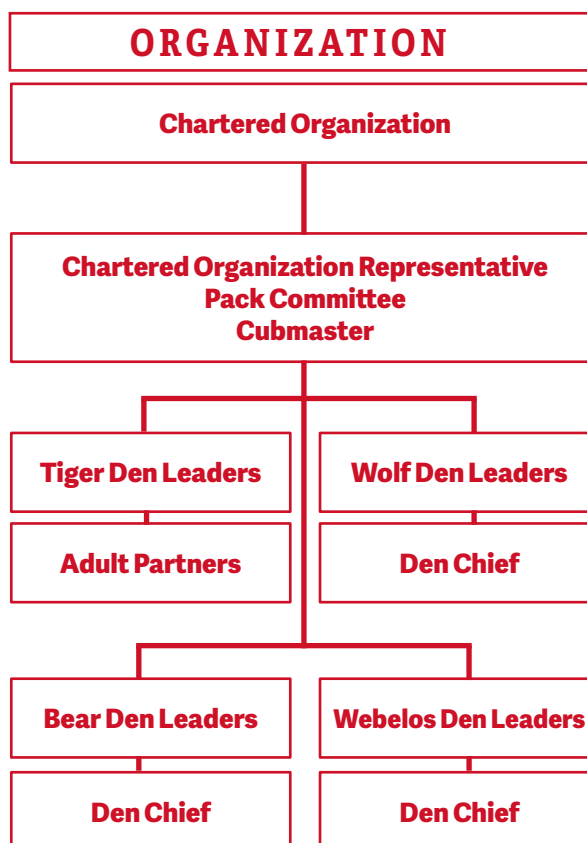
- Packs are made up of one or more Dens.
- Packs meet once a month. All Cub Scout families are expected to participate.
- Pack meetings are led by the Cubmaster.
- Pack meetings are the climax of the month's Den meeting and activities.
- Pack meetings have games, skits, stunts, songs, ceremonies and presentation of badges that the Scouts earned that month.

## The Pack is run by the Pack Committee

- Includes all interested parents.
- Meets once a month (or more often if needed.)
- Led by a Committee Chairman
- Committee provides leadership, finds meeting places, performs record keeping, manages Pack finances, orders badges, maintains Pack equipment, helps train leaders, recognizes leaders and organizes field trips.

## The Pack is owned by a Chartered Organization

- Chartered Organizations include parent-school organizations, religious institutions, service clubs and other organizations interested in youth.
- Chartered Organizations approve leadership, help secure a meeting place, keep the Pack within sponsor's and Boy Scout guidelines and policies.
- Chartered Organizations select a Chartered Organization Representative (a liaison between your Pack and your sponsor.)



# Cub Scout Motto

## Do Your Best

### Tiger Scouts

Tiger is a school year program for first grade Scouts. Each Tiger participates with a parent (or another adult family member) in family-oriented activities.

The time you and your Scout spend in Tiger Scouts is meant to be fun, a chance to get to do things with your family as well as other members of the Tiger Den.

### Cub Scouts

Cub Scouting is a home-based and neighborhood-centered program designed to support family life for Scouts in second through fifth grades. Each Cub Scout learns to respect their home, country, God, and other people. The program also helps Scouts this age to:

- Learn new physical skills through sports, crafts, and games.
- Learn how to get along with others through group activities.
- Develop new skills.
- Develop personal independence.

Cub Scouting teaches them to “do your best” and be helpful to others as expressed in the Cub Scout Promise.

A Cub Scout Den provides your Scout with a group of children their own age with whom they can earn status and recognition. In the Den, they will also gain a sense of personal achievement for the new skills they learn.





## The Advancement Plan



Kindergartners work toward the **Lion** rank. The Lion rank is earned by completing five adventures. Although participation with an adult partner is required for all Lion awards, recognition items are for the Scouts only.

### Bobcat

All Scouts first thru fifth grade, regardless of age, must first earn the **Bobcat** badge by learning the Scout Law, Scout Oath handshake, salute, sign and motto. After receiving the Bobcat badge, Scouts work on requirements based on their grade level.



### Tiger

**Tiger** is an exciting program for first grade Scouts (or those who are 7 years old) and their adult partners. Tiger introduces Scouts and their adult partners to the excitement of Cub Scouting. Tiger Scouts complete six adventures and one elective displayed on their belt.

### Wolf

A Cub Scout who has completed first grade (or is age 8), works on six adventures and one elective to earn the **Wolf** rank.



### Bear

A Cub Scout who has completed second grade (or is age 9), works to complete six adventures and one elective to earn his **Bear** rank.

### Webelos

When a Cub Scout has completed the third grade (or becomes 10 years old), they transfer to a **Webelos** den, led by an adult Webelos leader. The Scout works on requirements for the Webelos badge, five adventures, two electives and in the second year, the *Arrow of Light Rank* (the highest rank in Cub Scouting.)



Camping and outdoor programs are an important part of the 18 month Webelos program. Between February and April of a Webelos Scout's 5th grade year, they graduate from Cub Scouting into the adventure of Scouts, BSA at an impressive graduation ceremony. Every Scout deserves the opportunity to be a Scout.

## Special Events & Programs

### Cub Scout Family Overnights

#### October 10 - 11 and October 24-25

Cub Scout Family Overnights are a chance for you to come camping with your Cub Scouts for a night of Scouting fun. These are designed to get you connected to your pack and is run by pack leaders. The program offers games, food, and a fun theme for your Cub Scout to make memories and to help introduce them to Scouting.

### Babbitt Cub World

#### Year Round Activities

Cub World is a family program designed for Cub Scouts and their families to participate in either an overnight or single day experience with selected theme areas as the focus for the program. The program is designed to be run by your pack leaders with theme packets available with crafts, ceremonies, games, den and pack meeting ideas.

### Blue & Gold Banquet - Happy Birthday Scouting!

#### February

A birthday party for Scouting held at your Pack meeting in February. Most often dinner is included and special programs or entertainment is customary. This is also where Pack leaders and volunteers are recognized. The Friends of Scouting Fundraising Campaign holds a presentation to each Pack and their families.

### Day Camp

#### June

An exciting summertime week long activity that includes crafts, games, nature, sports, songs and skits. Day Camps are held in each District at various locations around the Council.

### Cub Scout Resident Camp

#### June

A fun filled three days and two nights of camping just for Cub Scouts and Webelos. Scouts and their Leaders will participate in age-appropriate activities held at Babbitt Cub World at Zink Scout Ranch.

# The Role of the Council and the District

The purpose of the Council is to guide and support its Districts for the achievement of the movement's purpose. The **Indian Nations Council** includes communities that are located in the eastern part of the state. The Council serves 18 counties in Eastern Oklahoma.

The purpose of the District is to organize and support successful Units by working through Chartered Organizations. The end result of effective District support is continued growth in membership and those members receiving a quality program.

The District Committee serves as a vehicle by which the Scouting program and services are carried to the Chartered Organization, their Units and youth. It serves as a sounding board for the needs of Chartered Organizations and Units. This enables the consideration of those needs as the Council program is planned. The District Committee also participates in the building and raising of the Council budget, which finances the Scouting program.

Since the major role of the Council, and its Districts, is to extend Scouting and to provide service to all youth and adults who participate, please feel free to call upon an appropriate representative when you need help. # The Role of the Council and the District

Scouting operates through volunteer leadership. Volunteer unit leaders are an example of Scouting's principle of service to others.

## Parents are the primary source of leaders in the Scouting program.

By volunteering, you not only serve Scouting but also serve your child and their friends. This gives you the chance to be a positive influence on the youth in our community.

## What do I Receive in Return?

Being a leader is fun and rewarding. The following are just some of the many dividends that will enrich your life as you dedicate your time, talent and enthusiasm to Scouting.

- Fun and fellowship with other families, sharing your pride in the Scouts' accomplishments.
- A chance to help Scouts learn good citizenship and to help shape them into young people who have strength of character and are sensitive to the needs of others.
- The opportunity to help make a difference in the lives of Scouts as they grow strong.



## Pack Volunteer Leadership

**Cubmaster** helps plan and carry out the Pack program with the help of the Pack Committee, emcees the monthly Pack meetings and attends the Pack Leaders' meeting.

**Den Leader(s)** leads the Den at weekly Den and monthly Pack meetings and also attends the monthly Pack Leaders' meeting.

**Pack Committee** members perform administrative functions of the Pack. Some positions on the Pack Committee include:

- Committee Chair presides at all Pack Leaders' meetings. Helps recruit adult leaders. Attends Pack meetings.
- Secretary/Treasurer keeps all records for the Pack, including Pack bank account, financial records, etc. Attends Pack meetings and Pack Leaders' meetings.
- Advancement Chair maintains advancement records for the Pack. Orders and obtains all badges and insignia. Attends Pack meetings and Leaders' meetings.

**Parent Helpers** - Functional chairman positions are auxiliary to the Pack Committee and perform "one shot" program responsibilities. These responsibilities are of short duration. Some of the areas to select from include:

- Popcorn Sales Committee
- Cub World Coordinator
- Cub Day Camp Coordinator
- Pinewood Derby Committee
- Blue and Gold Banquet Committee
- Camp Card Sales Committee

# Youth Protection Training for Leaders

## So, You're A New Leader?

Congratulations, and thanks for volunteering to make a difference in the lives of some really great Scouts. The Boy Scouts of America has some really great training. To begin, you will need to take **Youth Protection Training**. To take online training you will need to create your *MyScouting* account.

To create your *MyScouting* account, go to **[my.scouting.org](http://my.scouting.org)** and watch the account creation demo.

Once you have established your *MyScouting* account, you can log in. Go to Training on the menu on your left, click on E-Learning, then click on the Cub Scout tab to find **Youth Protection Training**. Scroll down to find additional courses.

The training continuum for Cub Scout Leaders includes: Youth Protection training and Leader Position Specific training.

A trained leader is better qualified to run a quality, fun-filled program. Leaders who understand the why's and how's of the program are more effective in their roles. They know how to use available resources to provide an exciting and worthwhile program for Scouts.
